I'm absolutely engrossed in Isaiah right now. As a pastor, I find reasons to locate myself all around the Bible. I tend to preach out of the Revised Common Lectionary, open meetings with psalms or microdoses of epistle or gospel texts, and I teach Bible studies based on the interests of my congregation, wherever that may lead. But when I am in my little happy place of personal scriptural devotion and study, I am the sort who obsesses.

I used to wish that my relationship with scripture was the sort that reads through the Bible every year. I would make plans, use checklists, and get into rhythms. I would try to force myself to get through every word of the Bible over the course of twelve months. I'd try to read cover to cover. I had plans that mixed new and old testament readings. I followed the daily lectionary, which covers the whole Bible in two years. I tried it all. None of it clicked with me. No matter what I tried, it felt like I was forcing my way through the words. It felt like drag. It became a chore to read the Bible.

I went through a phase where, other than the scripture reading necessary for my work, I was not spending time in scripture anymore. I couldn't make sense of the contrast between my theology of scripture as good news about God that comes across in my work and the eye heavy dryness of my personal reading. It took me a while to realize that the way I was approaching the Bible in my personal life was hurting my relationship with it. I was approaching the Bible the way I approach long distance running, in terms of how I can handle the pain and push to the finish, which was not a spiritually fulfilling way to engage a holy text (it is a great way to crush a 22 mile trail run though).

At some point, I realized what I was doing. I noticed that I found my work with scripture fulfilling because I approached the text with the assumption of it being good news and that I found my personal engagement with scripture unfulfilling because I approached the text with the assumption of it being painful. I needed to let myself be as open to the wonderings of the Holy Spirit in my personal devotion as I was in my sermon preparation. Actually, I needed to be even more open.


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SEPTEMBER

I broke my Bible reading drought while I was preparing for a sermon. I don't remember the exact text, but there was a parallel in or an obscure reference to a passage in 1 Chronicles, and I realized that it had been ages since I read anything out of Chronicles. I was moved by curiosity and wonder to go back to it. I became obsessed with 1 and 2 Chronicles. For about two months, that's what I read. Some days I read chapter after chapter, other days just a few verses and then sat looking out the window for ten minutes, but I read every day. The experience renewed my sense of wonder in the Bible. I allowed the words to sink into me, allowed the stories to disturb and confuse and comfort and inspire. I gave myself permission to ask stupid questions. I looked up some answers to questions in the Bible Dictionary, but other questions I let linger... and that felt right. It was wonderful. It was literally a reading full of wonder.

Then I got to the end of 2 Chronicles. Without hesitation, I dove into 1 Peter. Why 1 Peter? I haven't the slightest clue, but I devoured it. And the chain continued, bouncing from obsession to obsession, reinvigorating my love of these words, the power of these words, the play and wonder and my curiosity in these words, these living, breathing, crazy, wonderful, powerful words.

There is no single 'right' way to read scripture. There is a single Spirit who moves through us and moves us into the text in the way that speaks joy and meaning to each of us. Reading through the Bible on a year or two -year cycle is a beautiful practice for many Christians. If that is your gravy, keep it up; that's awesome. It's been a long time since I last read the Bible cover to cover, and that's okay. Because right now, I'm obsessed with Isaiah, and through Isaiah, the word lives inside me.
