I'm surrounded by calendars.

I open my computer and there's a daily calendar right in front of me. I look to my right and there's a calendar on the wall. I look straight ahead and there's a calendar *on top of another* calendar.



The first calendar is one that Mieke and I share, and which is necessary for us to manage our day-to-day as it displays availability and divides responsibilities (read: who is dropping Theo off, who is picking Theo up, who is preparing this or that meal for Theo, who will be there in Theo's general proximity should a need arise. Our son had better never learn how much sway he has in our house or we might be in trouble....). With two working parents and a young child, checking this calendar multiple times daily and adding events to it immediately is critical in ensuring that everything remains organized in our household. We can achieve each of these things wherever we are thanks to Google and the internet (Mom and Dad: how did you guys make this work when you both had jobs and 6 kids?!?).

Speaking of our son, the calendar on the right is also Theo-centric. Recently staff at his school put together a goal-oriented plan for Theo so that we could address his behavioral challenges together. Wanting to bolster his incentive to meet his daily goal, Mieke drew up a calendar/chart upon which Theo gets to place a sticker each day that he meets his goal. So far he has 5 stickers; when he gets the 10th he gets a small Lego set. He's only missed out on his goal one day since this plan was put together by the talented and attentive staff at his school (I fully acknowledge the integral part of Legos in this collaborative effort).



There is a story behind the two calendars that are on the wall straight ahead of me. Two or three years ago Theo did an Advent calendar for the very first time. He loved it; he looked forward to it every night so much that I told Mieke we had probably better start keeping a regular calendar on the wall for him to put a sticker upon every night. So that's what we did, and for several hundred nights we've continued and he likely has no memory of not putting a sticker on a calendar before he goes to bed.

The final calendar, of course, is the aforementioned Advent calendar. It's only there one month of the year, but that month is now. And, again, it's there because of Theo.

Have you noticed anything that these calendars have in common?

That's right: our son is the most important part of – or the reason for – all of them. We wouldn't have any of the three calendars on the walls if not for him, and the shared Google calendar that Mieke and I use would not need to be checked every day. We'd have exactly one calendar and it wouldn't be nearly so important as it currently is.

As I considered this fact, my eyes were drawn again to the Advent calendar in front of me. There would be no reason for *any* of us to have an Advent calendar were it not for *God's* son: Jesus Christ. For us Christians, our lives should be built around God's only son just as Mieke's life and as my life – clearly evidenced by all of these calendars/charts around me – are built around *our* own son. Every day, I look at the calendar(s) as I prepare to respond to what my child requires.

When we look at our Advent calendars, are we preparing our hearts to respond to what the Christ child requires?

As I pondered this, even I - a pastor – was forced to ask myself if I have the same devotion to Jesus that I have to Theo.

In these 24/25 (calendar) or 22-28 (liturgical year) days every year, does our devotion to and preparation for God's son – the Christ child – equal our devotion to the calendars we keep for 365 days every year? Probably not. It should, given it's only 4 weeks versus 52......but it doesn't. Jesus is a background thing. Advent is a fun and enchanting time for us to enjoy the story of Jesus' birth and to eat a piece of chocolate every day, but to put away once all the


presents are open and we're stuffed with roast beef and eggnog.

Why? I can understand following the liturgical year and walking with Jesus through his adult years and through Lent and his journey to the cross and his death and resurrection on Easter Sunday. This makes sense to me. What makes no sense to me at *all* is that we are so willing to let go of how captivated we are during this special Christmas time. Is it because the novelty would just wear off if it was all the same year-round, every day? Really? If you're a Christian, are you saying that all Jesus is for us and does for us gets boring?? Ok, fine. If so, here's my solution: put away the cold and the snow and the Christmas lights and decorations and candy and the Advent calendars on 12/26. In other words: do what you probably already do (and notice how it already looks different)! But when you put everything away in boxes, *resist* the habit of shelving the magic and enchantment that so long ago was born out of amazing new hope and possibility in Jesus' miraculous, life-changing and world-changing birth.

Every day as we look at our calendars – Advent and beyond – I hope that we can put a sticker on there that just says "Jesus." If we do, we might capture Advent in a bottle: The Messiah remains magic for us all year long and every single day the devotion of our hearts and the ordering of our daily lives is built around *God's* son. I don't want to just do what *my* son requires. I want to do what the *Christ child* requires: love the Lord with all my heart, and with all my soul, and with all my mind, and love my neighbor as myself.

May our devotion be not to this world, but rather to the Christ child for whom we wait. ...when Jesus comes, I want to show him not 24 - not 28 - but 365 stickers with his name on them.
