THE KIRK KONNECTION

I had an interesting visit to Grand Rapids this past week.

During my time in GR (as we Michiganders refer to the 2nd largest city in our state), I had the privilege of attending the Calvin Symposium on Worship at Calvin College, my wife's alma mater. The symposium had been advertised by its sponsor, the Calvin Institute of Christian Worship, as a conference that "brings together a wide audience of artists, musicians, pastors, scholars, students, worship leaders and planners," and the CICW also made the statement that "People come from around the world for a time of fellowship, worship, and learning together, seeking to develop their gifts, encourage each other and renew their commitment to the full ministry of the church."

When I read about the vast array of folks who would be attending and presenting at this conference, I assumed that at least some of the presenters would employ the same sort of inclusive language that much of my home Presbytery of Detroit and my denomination of PC USA has adopted in recent years. This proved to be a naïve assumption, as I did not hear any speaker or leader of worship, panels or seminars do so.

I recognize that this is a non-issue for many people (that was never clearer to me than it was last week), and even though we strive to use this language at my own church I was genuinely surprised at just how much the lack of it at the symposium affected me.

Quick definition of inclusive language, courtesy dictionary.com:

1. language that avoids the use of certain expressions or words that might be considered to exclude particular groups of people, esp gender-specific words, such as "man", "mankind", and masculine pronouns, the use of which might be considered to exclude women

When I began attending seminary I did not use this sort of language, but Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary quickly changed all that. They made it clear that their standard – and the only acceptable sort of language submitted on paperwork at LPTS – had to conform to the definition above. Having no choice but to play by their rules, I began to refer to God as God (and not as he). Did I think it was ridiculous at first? You bet I did. Did my feelings on the matter change completely before I graduated? You bet they did.

Allow me to be clear and concise: I have no issue with anyone who does not use inclusive language. And no; I am not playing both sides here: I believe that everyone is entitled to their own theology and to their own way of expressing that theology. I have simply made this personal observation: Inclusive language is more welcoming than the alternative. It doesn't matter what I or anyone else thinks language does or what it means; all that matters is what the individual hearer is experiencing when they hear what they hear. And if I can be more welcoming to more people and do a better job of reflecting the love and passion of Christ by using this sort of language – without forsaking my own beliefs – I would prefer to do that.

What ways have I tried to serve God, the church and others?

Leading the grief support group for prison families. Volunteering to help others. Being an Elder, numerous times. Using some of the talents He has given me to help others.

I started coming to the KIRK because we lived near Wayne & Ford Rds, and my mom was a member of Garden City. Kirk of our Savior had formed a mission church and was meeting at Cady Elementary School. The first time we were there, I checked the box that mom was interested in joining-the rest is history. (There is more to the story. Ask me about it.)



I knew God was working in my life with my involvement in prison ministry. It began after my first husband died in 1990. I never asked God, "why?"-I always knew there was a reason, I just didn't know the specifics until an indirect family member went to prison. I watched the heartache of other family members and realized they were grieving the loss of a loved one—not through death, but something uglier-through the prison system. Grief is grief. I started a support group for those with incarcerated loved ones. I am still leading this group after 8 years-God saw a need, and put me where I could help others.

Three things on my bucket list:

- 1. Maintain good health so we can enjoy things for many years to come
- 2. Take at least 30 lbs off, so I can have an entire new wardrobe to make #1 a reality.
- 3. Slow down from some of my current activities and spend more time traveling in our motorhome.

I enjoy a variety of craftscrocheting baby blankets, making jewelry from spoons and beads; just being creative. I learned I can make some pretty nice floral arrangements, but I can't draw a straight line! I can write and enjoy public speaking! "Love my Toastmasters"-17 years. I enjoy dancing, karaoke, riding the back of Frank's motorcycle, camping and just love life! Dearly love helping those in the support group hold their heads high and begin to heal their broken hearts.

KROGER COMMUNITY REWARDS

The Meijer Community Rewards program which the Kirk participated in for a number of years was ended mid-year by Meijer, and the Kirk has finally been qualified to participate in the Kroger Community Rewards program which will provide the Kirk a small portion of income when member's do regular grocery shopping and get gas. The program is similar to what Meijer did, but Kroger puts no requirements on method of payment used. The essence of the Kroger program is the KrogerPlus card which is their standard card that is scanned at the register in order to obtain sale prices. If you are even a semi-regular shopper at Kroger you probably have one. If you don't have one you can apply at the service desk of your local Kroger store. The next step in the program for all members' KrogerPlus accounts is to register on-line and designate the Kirk as your charity of choice. Not only Kirk members can do this, but your family and friends can do it as well. Below are the instructions for registering. It is not as daunting as it seems, but if you have questions about registering or need assistance see Fred Kirk or Joan Nystrom.

TO USE THE KROGER COMMUNITY REWARDS PROGRAM:

Register online at krogercommunityrewards.com

Be sure to have your Kroger Plus card handy and register your card with your organization after you sign up.

Click on Sign In/Register

Most participants are new online customers, so they must click on SIGN UP TODAY in the 'New Customer?' box. Sign up for a Kroger Rewards Account by entering zip code, clicking on favorite store, entering your email address and creating a password, agreeing to the terms and conditions

You will then get a message to check your email inbox and click on the link within the body of the email.

If you already have an online account, for example to receive offers and emails from Kroger, you can just sign in.

Click on My Account and use your email address and password to proceed to the next step.

Click on Edit Kroger Community Rewards information and input your Kroger Plus card number.

Update or confirm your information.

Enter NPO number or name of organization, select organization from list and click on confirm.

To verify you are enrolled correctly, you will see your organization's name on the right side of your information page and the Kirk's name should appear at the bottom of all your receipts after 48 hours.

Do you use your phone number at the register? Call 877-576-7587 to get your Kroger Plus card number.

Members must swipe their registered Kroger Plus card or use the phone number that is related to their registered Kroger Plus card when shopping for each purchase to count.

2017 PER CAPITA

Per Capita is the charge that each Presbyterian Church is billed annually to meet various operations at both the local Presbytery and national church levels. At the Kirk and at most other individual local churches, members are encouraged to help reimburse this larger expense. This year (2017) the amount suggested to be donated by the congregation is \$26 per member, an amount unchanged from 2016. Please consider paying this amount in the regular offering sometime in the coming months. If you have a box of giving envelopes there is a dedicated colored envelope for Per Capita payments included, but you can also just mark the payment on any envelope you choose. Thank you.

Surprisingly the Kirk had a successful December in light of 3 pay periods

occurring during the month. Usually in such months we have difficulty covering expenses with normal income but this December income was strong. For the year we had an excess of \$2,359 that occurred through higher weekly offerings

as well as a higher volume of investment gains in our mutual funds. This more than offset a cost for tree removal and additional salary costs due to the Board of Pensions delaying Mike's pension payment from his hiring until January.

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As I scanned a room of 300 people that was 99% white and 85% male, I reflected on the Symposium's theme: "The Faithful Witness: Being Christ's Church in an Apocalyptic World." The description included the following: "Throughout our world in recent years, Christians along with everyone else have been convulsed by terrorism, martyrdom, persecution, and political upheavals of many varieties." When I read that statement, I thought of all the good friends I've made in ministry over the years – minorities of every type: gender, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, religious status, disability status, etc – who would have had difficulty receiving the witness that the presenters at the symposium were attempting to impart.

Language matters. Words matter. It's important to take responsibility and great care in our communication with all people, and this past week I was so thankful and proud to be a part of Kirk of Our Savior, Detroit Presbytery and the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. We as individuals are not the same, and that's ok. In all of these families I have been so lucky to witness a celebration of diversity and a welcoming spirit that I have not felt everywhere else. In the midst of this welcome and celebration, though, it will never quite be possible for me to understand the experiences of those who are not just like me. Therefore it was a gift for me to worship in a great sea of fellow Christians while *I* for once was the fish out of water
